

PROVERB PROPHECY

MY GRANDFATHER HAD AN UNCANNY ABILITY TO PREDICT THE weather. But was he just a lucky kook? I spoke with Brian LaMarre, a NOAA meteorologist, to see if those old-time proverbs hold merit. —J.M.

Red sky in morning, sailor take warning. Red sky at night, sailor's delight.

Particles in the atmosphere, such as precipitation and pollution, cause blue light to scatter, leaving mostly red wavelengths. High air pressure, which indicates fair weather, holds these particles close to the earth, causing a vibrant red. As weather systems often approach from the west, a red sunset means smooth sailing. However, if you get a red sunrise, then high pressure is to the east and a low-pressure system, which brings clouds or storms, may follow.

• A wind from the south has rain in its mouth.

South wind doesn't always mean rain, but low-pressure systems spin counter-clockwise and the leading edge of these systems will have a south blow, followed by storms.

• Mare's tails and mackerel scales make tall ships take in their sails.

There are no sails for us to take in, but boaters should beware: A scaly or ribbed sky is the mark of cirrocumulus clouds, a sign of moisture with an approaching warm front. Wind and rain will follow.

• Seagull, seagull, sit on the sand—it's a sign of rain when you're at hand.

These stupid birds actually know something. During a low-pressure system, it's harder for the birds to fly to feeding grounds because the air is thin. So sitting gulls usually means there's rough weather offshore.
